Wellbeing

It is important to recognise that it is normal and natural to feel some anxiety when you are following a formal process and that the University has support in place to help you with your wellbeing. Reasons for a student discipline statement

While there is no requirement to write a student statement here is how it may help a with student discipline process. A student statement:

- Helps you focus on key points and explains the impact of your experience
- Shares key points with a supporter before your student discipline meeting
- Answers the questions the investigator may have
- Acts as a 'script' in your meeting with the investigator
- Forms part of the official record of the meeting
- Is a written record to help the investigator consider your claim or your response to a claim

Providing students with free, independent and confidential advice and information







Potential sections include:

Introduction – a chance to thank the Investigator and outline what you will cover in your statement.

Main body

Claimant – an opportunity to explain your experiences and link them to any relevant policies, processes or reasonable expectations that relate directly to your experiences.

Respondent – an opportunity to explain your experiences and counter any claims made against you, particularly focusing on those claims that are contested.

Witness – an opportunity to explain your understanding of events as a key witness.

Further Information – Here is a chance for you to describe what the impact of the matters under discussion have been on you, regardless of your role within the student discipline process. If you have been accessing support resulting from the issues under discussion this may be an opportunity to disclose this to the Investigator.

Summary/desired outcome – While a student discipline meeting provides ample opportunity to present key facts you may wish to finish with a sentence summarising the key message for the investigator.
