About volunteering with SUSU:

The Disabilities Officer works to represent student with disabilities at Southampton. This includes working to collaborate with relevant student and community groups to help promote the interests of disabled students. You will also work with teams at SUSU and the University to help promote campaigns and activities.

In order to apply for the role, you must have experience of living with a disability. When applying for this role you are confirming that you meet the eligibility criteria for the role.

We provide full training at the beginning of the year as well as advice and support as you continue in your role. You will gain a wealth of experience through your voluntary role with SUSU, experience that you can use to improve your future employability while receiving recognition for the work you accomplish.

Main purpose of the role:

- 1) To act as the lead representative for disabled students.
- 2) To work to promote the interests of disabled students.
- 3) To collaborate and work with relevant student and community groups.

Main responsibilities of the role:

To act as the lead representative for disabled students

- To facilitate the Disabled Students' Network, leading monthly meetings and working with other representatives to ensure relevant issues are discussed.
- To be accessible to disabled students as a key point of contact between the Union and the disabled student community.
- To identify issues experienced by disabled students though consultation with the relevant student cohorts, and feed back on these issues to the relevant Sabbatical Officer, Union staff, and University staff.

To work to promote the interests of disabled students

- To work with relevant Sabbatical Officers and staff to ensure that the needs of disabled students are reflected through the activities of the Union.
- To work with the VP Welfare & Communities on planning and promoting events such as Disability History Month.
- To be the lead on other campaigns that are topical and relevant to the disabled student community.

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To collaborate and work with relevant student and community groups.

- To work alongside societies which represent disabled students to promote and support their activities.
- To promote links with other similar groups and organisations, within the local community, regional area, and nationally.
